



SFMOMA's 2026–27 Exhibitions Highlight Fashion, Korean Modern Art and Northern California Craft

Contemporary Exhibitions Feature New Work by Raven Chacon, Sarah Sze, Jacob Hashimoto and the 2026 SECA Art Awardees



SAN FRANCISCO, CA (August 19, 2026) — The San Francisco Museum of Modern Art (SFMOMA) announces its program of exhibitions through Spring 2027, featuring presentations that explore the intersections of fashion, craft, art and architecture, and exhibitions of artists from the Bay Area and beyond.

“SFMOMA is driven by a commitment to presenting exhibitions that expand and enhance our understanding of art and its relationship with the world around us,” said Christopher Bedford, Helen and Charles Schwab Director of SFMOMA. “The upcoming year of exhibitions reflects this ambition through bold new commissions, landmark exhibitions and presentations that celebrate the creativity and craft of the Bay Area, while connecting it to global artistic dialogues across disciplines.”

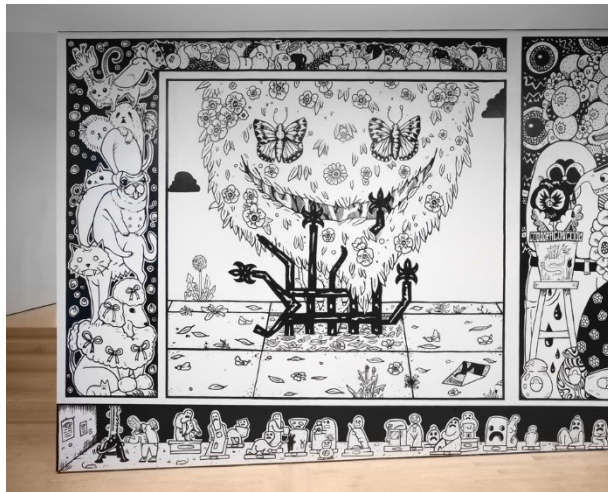

Bay Area Walls: Craig Calderwood
July 11, 2026–June 2028

In *Omen Studies* (2026), a mural commissioned by SFMOMA for the *Bay Area Walls* series, Craig Calderwood draws upon their visually bold yet intricate vernacular of symbols and patterns to tell a story of transformation. An oleander tree stands witness to the unwelcome impacts of urban beautification and increasing surveillance in San Francisco’s Mission District. The change

of scenery in Calderwood’s work portrays disappearing queer spaces and a gradual removal of the vibrant neighborhood’s identity.

O. Smith: Artist

July 25, 2026–June 20, 2027

Orlando Smith is a graphic artist whose drawings carry urgent political demands. A self-described “artist”—both artist and activist—he uses pencil and paper to chronicle the senselessness of the criminal legal system and to indict abuses of power in the United States and around the globe. Driven by an irrepressible creative force, and a deep belief in the humanity of all people, Smith’s work fearlessly confronts injustice while crying out for universal civil rights. It is righteous, loud and productive: a new kind of American Gothic.



Bay Area Walls: Isaac Vazquez Avila

August 8, 2026–July 2027

Isaac Vazquez Avila’s mural fuses a range of different processes and influences. From hand-painted signage to the energetic, textured strokes of David Alfaro Siqueiros’ Polyforum panels in Mexico City, this Bay Area Walls project also references the DIY spirit of

Los Angeles’ Ramona Gardens and Estrada Courts murals, as well as the atmosphere of Bay Area coastal and inland landscapes.



Jacob Hashimoto: Giant Arc
August 22, 2026—ongoing

Jacob Hashimoto blends sculpture and design in complex assemblages that seem to float through the air. His mesmerizing and intricate installations comprise thousands of hand-built kites made of bamboo and Japanese paper, some layered with colorful collaged-paper graphics. At SFMOMA, Hashimoto

launches the largest installation of his career, mixing nearly 75,000 elements suspended together into a cloud canopy. The enveloping exhibition covers the museum's free-to-visit Roberts Family Gallery from floor to ceiling and wall to wall.

RM x SFMOMA: Between You and Me
October 3, 2026–February 7, 2027

RM x SFMOMA: Between You and Me is the first museum exhibition featuring artworks from the personal collection of RM, of pop royalty BTS. *RM x SFMOMA* brings together nearly 200 works by Korean and international artists from the collections of RM and SFMOMA, including artworks in RM's collection that have never been publicly exhibited in the United States. On view at SFMOMA in its only U.S. presentation, the exhibition offers a rare chance to see modern and contemporary Korean artworks in conversation with artists from around the world and across different time periods. Visitors are invited to see familiar works in a new light and encounter others for the first time.





New Work: Raven Chacon

October 24, 2026–November 7, 2027

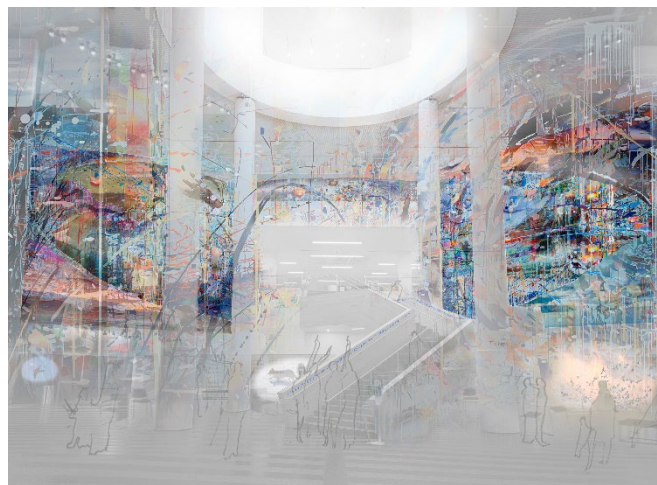
Pulitzer Prize–winning composer and artist Raven Chacon connects Diné worldviews with Western classical, avant-garde and noise music traditions in his sonic-centered practice to address Indigenous identity and sovereignty. For *New Work: Raven Chacon*, the artist debuts a five-channel silent film with drawings and an ambient soundtrack

of spaghetti western instrumentals and drone noises. Chacon juxtaposes Ray Bradbury’s *The Martian Chronicles* (1950) with video footage drawn from the Prelinger Archives film collection to compose a speculative depiction of travelers visiting Southwest tribal lands. Presented during the same year as the U.S semiquincentennial, this timely commission considers the Doctrine of Discovery as an ongoing, default principle leading to generational expansion of territories, both terrestrial and beyond.

Sarah Sze: Forever is Composed of Nows

November 21, 2026–ongoing

Sarah Sze’s *Forever is Composed of Nows* is a site-specific, multisensory commission composed of three monumental paintings and a dynamic flow of video projections and rhythmic, pulsating soundscapes that create a fully immersive experience. Inspired by the ephemerality of images, the fragility of nature and the passage of time, Sze’s most ambitious project to date transforms SFMOMA’s Evelyn and Walter Haas, Jr. Atrium into a shifting landscape where light, sound and movement intertwine. The exhibition’s title references a 19th-century poem by Emily Dickinson, whose written work resonates with Sze’s own meditation on time as a continuum of present moments, each adding to the memory of forever.





2026 SECA Art Award: CrossLypka, Em Kettner, Chanell Stone
December 12, 2026–May 30, 2027

The biannual 2026 SECA Art Award exhibition features the work of award recipients CrossLypka, Em Kettner and Chanell Stone. The SECA Art Award exhibition is the culmination of a process that included portfolio reviews of over 140 nominees and studio visits with [16 finalists](#). Since 1967, the SECA Art Award has honored more than 90 Bay Area artists with an exhibition at SFMOMA and an accompanying publication. The award distinguishes Bay Area artists whose work, at the time of nomination, has not received substantial recognition from a major institution.



Building Outlaws: How to Retreat, Rebuild, and Reconnect
December 19, 2026–January 2, 2028

Northern California has long been a place of radical reinvention. However, the period between the Vietnam War and the introduction of the World Wide Web heightened tensions between the mainstream and the margins, urban and rural, individual and collective—sparking innovation and social change. Responding to military conscription and institutional overreach, groups like the Merry Pranksters, the Diggers and the Black Panthers retreated from the mainstream and wrote manifestoes, instructions, and guides, which today offer a perspective on rebuilding during chaos. For this exhibition, Oakland's Girls Garage was commissioned by SFMOMA to design and build an immersive geodesic

dome and furniture that will display a selection of how-to manuals, film, photos, and posters from the period.



**Ponte City: Mikhael Subotzky and
Patrick Waterhouse
January 23–August 22, 2027**

From 2008 to 2014, artists Mikhael Subotzky and Patrick Waterhouse documented Ponte City, the iconic 54-story Johannesburg high-rise shaped by South Africa's complex political and social histories. Their kaleidoscopic portrait of the Apartheid-era brutalist tower draws from an archive of more than 1,400 photographs and ephemera,

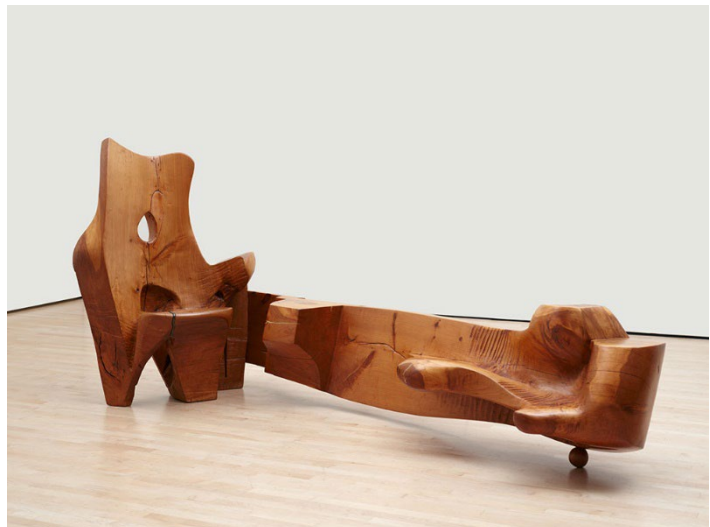
now part of SFMOMA's collection, transforming the galleries into an immersive environment that invites viewers to engage with the tower's many layers. In its first presentation in the United States, this timely exhibition explores themes of housing, migration, systemic inequality and the ever-evolving lives of buildings.

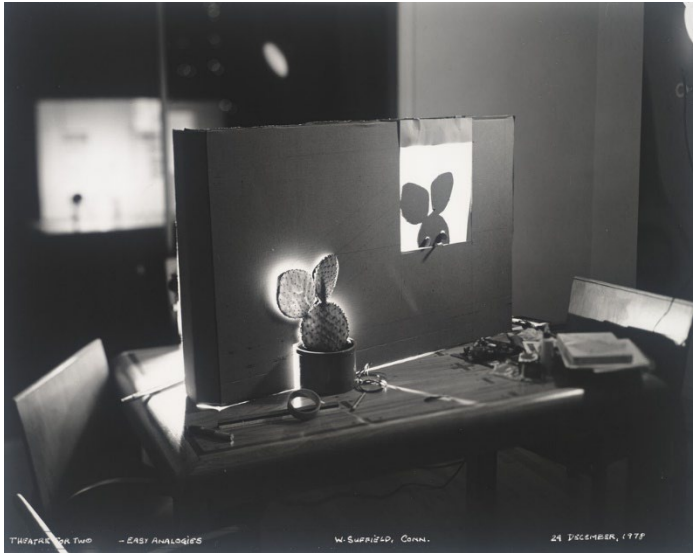
**Go Your Own Way: Northern
California Craft, 1945–80
February 13– November 14, 2027**

Go Your Own Way: Northern California Craft, 1945–80 will be the first major museum exhibition to feature the region's creative contributions to craft in the postwar decades.

Featuring 100 makers and more than 200 objects, including textiles, glass, ceramics, metal and basketry, it will explore the forces that shaped these

artists' practices, with special consideration to the sites of education, community and retail that flourished during this turbulent period. The exhibition will present Northern California's marvelous plurality of craft practices, documenting an unruly landscape of relationships and shadow histories that accelerated the richly unconventional currents of this region.





Theater of Two

March 13–December 12, 2027

Theater of Two explores the myriad, often surprising ways that pairs appear in photography, such as doubles, binaries, twinning, dualism and beyond. Inspired by Robert Cumming's *Theatre for Two—Easy Analogies* (1978), this permanent collection exhibition delights in our fascination with symmetry, repetition, and comparison in our everyday lives and

the ways we make sense of the world. *Theater of Two* invites visitors to consider analogies inherent to photography and experience examples of twoness firsthand, including analog photography's binary system of negatives and positives, diptychs, the recto and verso of individual photographs and the juxtaposition between different prints made from the same negative.

Fashioning Form: Dior to McQueen

April 17–August 7, 2027

Fashioning Form: Dior to McQueen presents more than 50 iconic couture and avant-garde fashions alongside 25 key works of postwar and contemporary sculpture, inviting visitors to consider the creative affinities between the sculpture studio and the fashion atelier. The first major fashion exhibition at SFMOMA in more than 40 years, this exhibition uncovers the fascinating dialogue between these two transformative genres. Innovative designers and artists of the past eight decades have eschewed tradition and challenged conventions through daring construction, experimentation with materials, and explorations of volume, texture and space. Together, the works on view cast both fashion and sculpture anew, blurring the boundaries between them.





Fashion designers featured include Cristóbal Balenciaga, Christian Dior, Rei Kawakubo, Alexander McQueen, Issey Miyake and Iris van Herpen, whose works are grouped thematically with sculpture by artists such as Louise Bourgeois, John Chamberlin, Lygia Clark, Henry Moore, Tatsuo Miyajima, Ernesto Neto and Cornelia Parker.
